Dr. David White, a 4-H Youth Development Specialist at OSU and the State Coordinator for Oregon 4-H Shooting Sports, presented a short program on Cognition Skills of the Young Marksman: Connecting Kids and Guns. A few snippets from the 1983 holiday classic, A Christmas Story made his point.

Ralphie's interest in and desire to own a BB gun, as you may recall, came with some minor personal injury.

Dr. White noted that not all youth are afford the protective barriers of proper introduction, instruction, and supervision when it comes to the safe and responsible use of firearms. Sometimes that first contact with a firearm and first pull of a trig-

ger comes at the hands of uninformed parents, guardians, other adults, and peers whose observed improper actions are later imitated. However, when under the proper supervision and circumstances, there can be a right time to connect kids and guns.

According to Dr. White, the maturing brain is a sensation seeking, risk taking machine which is highly impressionable and develops positively or negatively through observation and imitation. Start-

ing around the ages of 8 and 9 and continuing on into the twenties, the frontal lobes, that part of the brain responsible for judgement, insight, empathy, and impulse control remains an active construction zone. It is during the early years that memorization leads to recollection, internalization, and generalization of information begins to take shape.

Children do know right from wrong, observed Dr. White. Unfortunately, the late blooming of the front part of the brain means it does not have the capacity to prevent wrong answers or actions from happening. He suggests taking four cognitive skills into consideration when putting a firearm into the hands of youth. First, start by developing memory and focus on

the importance of muzzle, action, and trigger control. Second, monitor the young marksman's ability to recall these fundamental principles of safe and responsible use of firearms. When you begin to see these principles and actions becoming repeatable and second nature only then can you determine the level of supervision required to assure their safety and the safety of others. Finally, it is hoped that believing all firearms to be loaded, off safety, and ready fire will lead youth to consider the consequences of other actions. Namely, that driving and texting

is a mortal risk to them and others.

Dr. White encouraged the hunting community not to ignore youthful interest in and curiosity about firearms. Youth will seek out answers; sometimes from the

wrong source. Know that you have a responsibility, more often than expected, to chaperone the frontal lobes for children. Talk to children and parents about the role 4-H shooting sports can play in develop-

ing cognition skills in the young marksman. Questions about becoming a 4-H Shooting Sports Volunteer, leading a club, or enrolling youth in 4-H can be

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



Oregon National Guard Youth Challenge Program Scholarships



The 9 Habits of the Record Book Buck Hunter

The pursuit of animals for the record books had its genesis in the purest forms of the hunt, where the animal is used for its meat, and the head, hide and memory are preserved recognizing its excellence.

My first big blacktail buck taken in a patch of manzanita in the mountains east of Ashland did not qualify for Boone and Crockett because it was found east of the line where the club considers true blacktail live. Instead, we call it a Cascade blacktail, and the Record Book for Oregon's Big Game has a special category for such an animal.

I don't always hunt for a trophy. Sometimes I hunt for the experience, or to spend time with the kids or friends, but in the 18 intervening years since that first book buck, I've put three more bucks, a Columbia whitetail and two Columbia blacktails in the record books. Along the way, I've learned a few things about the places big bucks live and how to put them in the sights – especially in the rather primitive sights – of my 1840s-style muzzleloader. These then, are the 9 habits of the successful record book deer hunter. 1. Learn to score and field-judge antlers. Look at a mule deer or a blacktail rack and guess its B&C measurement.

2. Target one or more record books. Analyze the entries. Some parts of the West do not grow big deer due to genetics, soil content, habitat, hunter pressure and drought conditions. Record books to consider include the Boone and Crockett, Pope and Young, Safari Club, National Muzzle Loading Rifle Association (NMLRA), the Oregon Big Game and Washington Big Game record books.

3. Plan to hunt multiple deer each year, focusing on trophy areas. As an example, a hunter in Oregon could chase mule deer with a muzzleloader in the Juniper Unit and, with a 600-series tag, also hunt with a centerfire rifle in the Willamette Unit for blacktail deer. The same hunter could cross the Columbia and hunt blacktail deer in Lewis County, Washington, a proven producer of record book bucks, or go north to Alaska and hunt the Sitka blacktail. Sitka blacktails are easy to judge and almost any 4-point buck will make the record book on Kodiak Island or Prince of Wales.

4. Gain proficiency with rifle, bow and muzzleloader. Some areas will not produce a book buck for a hunter with a centerfire rifle, but there are lower minimums for record entry in P&Y Club (archery) or the NMLRA (muzzleloader).

5. Learn to read topographic maps and aerial photos. Trophy deer require ample feed, water, bedding areas and escape cover. Being able to visualize the ground while scouting at a kitchen table is a skill that sets big buck hunters apart from the rest of their camo and orange-clad brethren.

6. Hunt from mid-October to the first of December. The buck we are looking for is still out there. He got big because he is almost nocturnal. Toward mid-October, bucks, in their peak physical condition, start cruising for females and are prone to make errors in daylight hours.

7. Pass up 3-pointers. A 3-point buck will almost never make the record book. The trophy hunter has to pass up a 3x3 in order to take an animal with enough inches of measureable antler. It might mean not filling a tag. And that's the chance to take.

8. Hunt in the rain. My friend Sam Pyke has bagged several trophy animals in his favorite hunting area because he doesn't hunt until there is a major storm in the forecast. He bought the best rainy weather gear he could get and he is ready when the weatherman says it's time to go.


9. The final step? Enter the buck in the record book. After the mandatory 60-day drying period, it is eligible for measurement. Entry in the books costs something around \$25, which covers the clerical costs of the record book organization.

Some people scoff at record books, but there is a conservation imperative for keeping track of outstanding animals. The data gathered from record book entries shows the areas of the West where big blacktail, mule deer and whitetails make their living. Over a century of history reveals trends biologists and land managers can use to promote better conservation and wise use of resources.

OHA Quickly Repairs Deer Fence

On December 21 an OHA member was contacted and told that a vehicle had driven through a portion of the Deer Fence along U.S. 97 near Lava Butte and there was now a large section missing fence. With the holiday season approaching this could not have happened at a worst time with many of our contacts at ODFW, USFS and ODOT being gone due to taking an extended weekend off. We were told that there was more than 100 feet of fence missing but could not confirm the information. On December 24 (yes Christmas Eve) **Bill Littlefield** and **Eric Brown** took a Side by Side and patrolled the fence locating the damage. An assessment was made and the conclusion was that OHA could repair the fence even though it was beyond the scope of our agreement with the agencies. This was obviously an insurance claim for one of the agencies however OHA did not take a wait and see approach. On December 26 materials were gathered from ODOT for the fence repair and we put out a News Release to the local area. On December 27 five OHA members made the repairs. While the fence was being repaired a reporter and photographer from the Bend Bulletin stayed on scene doing interviews and taking pictures. **Peter Murphy**, ODOT PIO filmed the work being done and conducted interviews. The Bend Bulletin did a nice front page article on our work and Mr. Murphy did a YouTube video on the ODOT site

(<u>https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=oil42IhiVrs</u>). KTVZ did not come to the of our site our photos which they put on T.V. along with a short narrative. Tupelo Cow Hunt

"This hunt, is the whole month of December. I put many miles on my feet and vehicle. I was on tracks of a heard of 200 or so, I never saw them though. On December 26th, I came across a heard. I was able to get about 200 yards away and saw an elk stop. The head was covered by a tree. I took a knee but there were many animals running behind it. I saw it was a cow when it moved, but I choose not to shoot. I went back the next morning. I prayed before I left. At 5am hiked two miles to a canyon I thought they might be using. I heard the elk and moved to the left. I saw about six elk at 100 yards down hill. The head was covered by a tree. It started walking. I cow called, she looked up at me. I shot my Winchester 30-06 with 180 grain Nosler accubond. She went straight down. I was able to pack it all out myself despite the three herniated discs in my back.

I have been a bow hunter until my accident. This was my first elk. I butchered it all myself, it was a very satisfying hunt." "I thank **Cory Heath** for his time helping me with this hunt. Pick an elk that stands alone when you shoot and enjoy the woods! Going to the woods is going home!"

Charles Beckley Scholarship Introduction 2018

The Bend Chapter of the Oregon Hunters Association (OHA) has established a scholarship for higher education honoring the life-time member Charles Beckley, who passed away in 2004. Mr. Beckley was a dedicated OHA member and was among the first hunter education instructors in the state of Oregon. This scholarship furthers OHA's goal of helping to educate future hunters and outdoor enthusiasts.

Bend OHA is looking forward to handing out multiple scholarships this year ranging from \$250 to \$1000. The number of scholarships awarded and the amount of each is largely dependent on the amount of money available in the Charles Beckley Scholarship fund and the number of qualified applicants. Funds for these scholarships have been raised from the Charles Beckley raffle at the annual OHA Mule Deer Classic Banquet.

RULES:

Eligible applicants must be new or returning college students enrolled in any accredited trade school, technical school, community college or university.

The scholarship funds will be sent directly to the school at which the student in enrolled and will be credited to their account.

The scholarship award is a one-time gift and must be able to be used in the year it is awarded. Any unused funds will be returned to the scholarship fund by the school to be used for future awards.

Applicants must complete the scholarship application form and include an essay explaining why you should be selected. Include any past experiences that demonstrate how your values and experiences align with the OHA mission statement. You may include other materials such as letters of recommendation, photos of you engaged in outdoor activities or community service, past awards, or examples of leadership. Applications must be postmarked by <u>April 15, 2018.</u>

A recipient may apply for the scholarship again in subsequent years; however, winners will be selected from all eligible applicants each year and past success does not guarantee future success.

The applicant must be an OHA member or child of a member.

If awarded a scholarship, the recipient will provide the Bend Chapter of OHA with the college scholarship contact information. The chapter will contact the school and arrange for funds to be provided directly to the school.

SELECTION CRITERIA: Applicants will be judged on their application, eligibility requirements, volunteer work, essay and other materials provided. Applications will be reviewed by the Bend OHA Scholarship Committee with recommendations to the Bend Chapter board of directors.

2018 Bend Chapter OHA Scholarship Judging Criteria
