Oregon State Police Report:

A Trooper from Central Point responded to a reported Beaver in a ventilation pipe in Ashland. The animal had been chased into the pipe by dogs. Because of the filter position in the pipe the Trooper had to disassemble the pipe, and drag the 35 to 40 pound beaver out with a catch pole. The residents of the house had left prior to the Troopers arrival, but had returned in time to help the Trooper wrestle the heavy animal into a cage. The Beaver was released into nearby Bear Creek where it had likely came from prior to his encounter with the dogs.

Grants Pass patrol Trooper Ziegler responded to a game call where a witness told him that two men had killed a turkey. The witness provided good, accurate information and Trooper Ziegler was able to find the suspects. He also found the poached turkey hidden within a bag, that was then covered with a sleeping bag. One of the suspects was a felon but could not be placed in possession of a firearm. The other suspect admitted to killing the turkey. He was cited and released. The turkey and gun were seized.

Trooper out of Central Point received information recently about a possible looting at an archaeological site near Butte Falls. While in the area to discover and possibly set up a trail camera, the trooper spotted a guy on his hands and knees digging in the dirt around a stream. Upon contact, it was obvious the ground in the area was and had been completely worked over. The individual had a garden rake, pick ax and shovel. He said he was only looking for old bottles. Upon searching the area, the trooper noticed a pile of rocks in the front passenger seat along with an obvious arrowhead. The subject said he thought they were just rocks. The subject also had an arrest warrant. The subject was arrested on the warrant and cited criminally for Remove Archaelogical Object Without Permit.





Grants Pass and Central Point Troopers handled a call regarding a bear cub that had taken refuge in an outbuilding after being scared by th Reporting Party's (RP) dog. The sow had left the area, but the RP was concerned about their safety. They were advised to keep the dogs inside and avoid any human contact. The RP called back several hours later to advise that the cub had returned to the woods ansd was most likely reunited with it's mother.

Recent Board Actions:

The RVOHA Board of Directors met on April 25th and here is our report out on some of the topics covered:

- Discussed the final Arthur R. Dubs Foundation Grant Application process.
- Reviewed final 2019 Banquet Results and confirmed March 7th, 2020 for next year's event.
- Discussed and approved donation of \$2500 (to be matched with \$2500 of agency funding) to support purchase of a thermal imaging rifle scope for use in special projects for USDA Wildlife Services.
- Discussed Hunter Education firearms custody concerns and determined to secure those firearms with A&B Traders while consultations with legal experts are completed.
- Reviewed and discussed a proposed facility rent increase from \$300/month to \$400/month. The facility is where RVOHA Board Meetings and Banquet Meetings are held as well as providing some storage for Chapter assets.
- Discussed and approved additional allocation of funding at \$100/shooter for the two (2) established HS Shooting Teams (\$5100 total for 51 shooters each shooter's participation cost is roughly \$250/season). Additional consideration may occur with the addition of another team and/or qualification for National level competition.

ODFW Update:

We've had a busy spring at ODFW, and the following are highlights from recent events and projects completed in partnership with RVOHA.

Southwestern Oregon is a great place for turkey hunting and each year, the ODFW Denman Wildlife Area provides a venue for the RVOHA Youth Turkey Clinic. The clinic is a fun training opportunity for young turkey hunters, and each participant is taught the basics of turkey biology, habitat needs, and hunting techniques including stalking, calling, and use of camouflage. This year 35 youth hunters participated in the clinic.

Turkey season will be a busy time at the C2 Cattle Ranch, where this year's 12 lucky youth hunt winners will participate in a 1-day guided private-lands opportunity. In total, 151 applications were received for this hunt, and winners were selected in early April through a random draw. Support for hunting access to C2 was provided by RVOHA, which contributes critical matching funds needed for an Access and Habitat grant to support hunting and habitat improvements on the ranch.

ODFW and RVOHA also collaborated on the first ever Denman Wildlife Area 3-D Archery Shoot. The course featured 40 realistic animal targets on a two-mile trail loop. In total, 117 archers participated in the event, and everyone had a great time despite cold and wet conditions at the start. Volunteers were instrumental in setting up the course and staffing the event. If you would like to volunteer for future events, please contact the chair of the event subcommittee, Ricky Clark. The more volunteers, the more events we can support.

Best of luck on your spring hunts, and don't forget to apply for controlled hunts before May 15.







Young Oregon Hunters (YOH) Day is scheduled for June 8th. Last year RVOHA hosted about 120 youngsters and we anticipate even more for this year's event. Spread the word and come help us celebrate the introduction of a new generation of Sportsmen and Sportswomen to our ranks. We are happily accepting donations of lightly used hunting and fishing items for ages 5-17 to use as part of the event give away.

Why we do it/Why you might like to try:

There are many, many items of legislative interest that RVOHA and the rest of the OHA chapters statewide should be concerning themselves with - the upcoming Commission review of the revised Wolf Management Plan, Firearms-related bills, Access legislation, Anti-Poaching intiatives, etc. There are so many things to express a constructive and explicit opinion about with your legislative representatives. It's time to go on offense, so think about devoting some time to really understanding the issues, alternatives and options. All of us could stand to do something with the potential of influencing an outcome beneficial not only to ourselves, but future generations. So think about a night (or two) a week away from the brain-sucker and work on some thoughtfully constructed communications to your President, your Governor, your Senators, your Congressmen, your State Senators and your State Representatives. Do something without the expectation of a return and explore the potential value of your voice and the noble pursuit of volunteering time and energy to something bigger than any individual consideration.

A relatively famous quote goes something like this. "Never underestimate the power of a small group of committed people to change the world. In fact, it is the only thing that ever has." Now the question to ask ourselves is are we going to be that small committed group that changes the world **OR** are we going to stand idly by and allow a different small, but committed group change our lives forever. By evidence of our 34 ballots (out of a possible 1150+), we may have the beginning of an answer which most won't find much encouragement in...
