I hope to see you at the next meeting on April 10th.







Backcountry Hunters & Anglers

The upper Deschutes basin Salmon and Steelhead reintroduction program is looking for volunteers to help with spring Chinook fry stocking.

Volunteers are needed to help do backpack stocking in the Crooked River Canyon, Whychus Creek, and the Deschutes River canyon. This requires hikes ranging from 1 to 3 miles round trip. The hikes are strenuous and steep, with the weight of the backpacks typically average between 25-35 lbs. The fry put into bags and then loaded into backpacks for the hike down. If people are interested and do not have a backpack ODFW has a few that will hold a bag of fish.

Backpack stocking will be conducted on March 26th, with everyone meeting at the Crooked River Ranch church. Maps will be provided by ODFW reintroduction biologist for those interested. The Crooked River Canyon stocking will be completed first and then ODFW will provide lunch for volunteers that help out for the backpack section, then the Deschutes section will be completed. This will be the last fry stocking event where fry will be backpacked into the canyon sections, due to a management change to a completely smolt driven program for reintroduction efforts in 2020, so those that have not done this before or really enjoyed it previously this will be your last opportunity.

Volunteers are also needed to help stock fry via buckets on the Metolius River, and it's tributaries, and Whychus Creek if people are not able to physically backpack fry. These stocking events will occur on March 26th and March 27th with ODFW, USFS, and PGE.

Oregon gun control bills expected to roar to life

March is going out like anything but a lamb in the Oregon Legislature, where many hunting-relating bills are still going through the legislative process. OHA is tracking more than 1,700 bills daily and attending countless hearings and work group meetings on bills. Deadlines for respective chamber work to be completed are fast approaching, so it's now a question of just how many bills will make it out of committee before the deadline. Stay tuned.

Where are the Gun Bills?

No action has been taken on any of the gun bills we are following. The rumor is that a gun bill hearing will be scheduled for the first part of April. No word yet on what gun bill will be heard. Bills That Are Moving

• HB 2068 Percentage of Nonresident Tags: Increases percentage of nonresident tags that can be issued for hunting of black bear, cougar and antelope within areas that may be issued by drawing.

Update: Bill has passed House and is now in Senate Committee on Environment and Natural Resources.

- HB 2069 Unallocated Game Hunting Tags: Removes requirement that State Fish and Wildlife Commission to issue leftover game mammal hunting tags to anyone first-come, first-served; allows ODFW to restrict leftover tags to those who have not drawn a tag. Update: Bill has passed House and now is in Senate Environment and Natural Resource Committee.
- HB 2293 Residency Requirements: Amends residency requirements for purposes of licenses, tags and permits related to wildlife. Update: Work session scheduled for March 21.
- HB 2294 Commercial Urine Products: Requires that any commercial product that contains or is derived from cervid urine and designed for luring, attracting or enticing cervids be from herd free of chronic wasting disease.

Update: Bill has passed House and is now in Senate Environment and Natural Resource Committee.

- HB 2361 Multiyear Resident and Nonresident Hunting Licenses: Requires State Fish and Wildlife Commission to establish and prescribe fees for multiyear resident and nonresident hunting licenses. Sets agent fee for issuance of each multiyear license at \$5. Update: Work Session scheduled for March 26.
- HB 2747 Fish & Wildlife Commission Membership: The bill eliminates the provision that the Fish & Wildlife Commission will be made of members of the general public and instead lists various interest groups that must be represented.

Update: A workgroup has met and offered some changes in the bill. Amendments are being drafted.

• ĤB 2795 Cougar Bill: Creates a pilot program that allows a person to use dogs in the hunting and in the nonlethal pursuit of cougars within a county that elects to participate in the pilot program.

Update: Hearings have been held. No action on bill since the hearing.

• ĤB 2841 Information Disclosure: This bill allows ODFW to refuse disclosure of information relevant to department ability to manage or protect described fish or wildlife species or individual members or populations of species. Exempts information from disclosure as public record.

Update: Workgroup has drafted amendments for the bill.

• SB 723 Coyote Hunting Contest Ban Bill.

Update: A hearing has been held on this bill. We will fight this bill in the Senate and in the House.

Wolf plan vote, new regs highlight wildlife issues for spring ,By Jim Akenson, Sr. Conservation Director, Jim@oregonhunters.org
• Wolf plan input: In the wake of the recent postponing of the wolf plan vote by the Fish & Wildlife Commission, we are now waiting to see the final draft revision, which will be essential for our final OHA input. We will encourage members and chapters to provide input at the appropriate time. Watch for bullet points to emphasize in upcoming newsletters.

- Waterfowl regulations: Next waterfowl season there will be one pintail allowed rather than two as per recent years. The reduction in the pintail bag limit for 2019 is due to the population status of pintails last spring. The estimated breeding population in the traditional survey areas in Alaska and Canada was 2.37 million, the lowest since 2005 and down 40 percent from the long-term average (1955-2017).
- Big game regulation meetings: Summer is when the hunting season recommendations are formulated by ODFW, which include several public meetings across Oregon in July. If you have specific ideas, or concerns, please attend one of these meetings, which will occur in each region of the state. We will post the specific locations, dates, times once they are announced likely for May chapter newsletters.
- Electronic Licensing: The hunting aspect of electronic licensing starts with turkey and spring bear tag purchases. Remember, you can do this with vendor assistance and print a paper copy or try the electronic version, assuming your smart phone has the right application (see page 4 of the 2019 Big Game Regulations). Earlier problems with duplicating individual registrations have been remedied.

OHA Bend Chapter 2019 Scholarship

OHA awards scholarships to applicants based on the criteria identified herein while pursuing areas of study and careers that support OHA's mission of "Protecting Oregon's wildlife, habitat and hunting heritage."

Who is eligible for an OHA scholarship?

Eligible applicants must be new or returning college students enrolled in any accredited trade school, technical school, college or university. Applicants must be in a field of study which aligns with OHA's mission. Fields of study may include, but are not limited to: fish & wildlife, wildlife biology, forestry, environmental policy & planning, environmental law, public lands management, wildlife law enforcement, natural resources.

Who is not eligible for an OHA scholarship?

The following individuals and their family members are **ineligible** for awards: OHA officers and directors, members of the selection committee, trustees, and substantial financial contributors.

What criteria are used to judge applicants?

Applicants are judged on their application, eligibility requirements, volunteer work, essay and other materials provided. Applications will be reviewed by the OHA Scholarship Committee with recommendations to the board of directors. Below are the criteria by which each applicant's information will be evaluated. Consider the following points when answering application questions or writing your essay.

- Major course of study
- Involvement in OHA or other habitat projects (applicants will not be limited to OHA members)
- Extracurricular participation
- Leadership skills
- Community activities
- Awards
- Work experience
- Essay: Content, structure, and grammar
- Photos of you engaged in outdoor activities or community service
- An example of a goal you set for yourself and how you accomplished it

How are scholarship funds dispersed?

The scholarship funds will be sent directly to the school at which the student is enrolled and will be credited to their account. The scholarship award is a one-time gift and must be able to be used in the year it is awarded. Any unused funds will be returned to the scholarship fund by the school to be used for future awards.

What must I do to be considered for an OHA scholarship?

Applicants must complete the scholarship application form.

A recipient may apply for the scholarship again in subsequent years; however, winners will be selected from all eligible applicants each year and past success does not guarantee future success.

If awarded a scholarship, the recipient will provide OHA with the college scholarship contact information. OHA will contact the school and arrange for funds to be provided directly to the school See application insert to apply.
