This year's projects were adjacent to Little Summit Prairie with fence builds protecting Aspen stands. Two 4 wire fences were built along with a buck and pole fence. Volunteers began showing up as early as June 13th with the primary work day being the 18th.

Guzzlers 1 through 10 along with 900N and 900S were checked with some fence repairs being done, aprons cleaned, water bowls cleaned out and downed trees removed. Past buck and pole builds were also checked. Mud Springs need major work.

What we accomplished:

Approximately 1 mile of wire fence build at two locations and a buck and pole fence which was about 360 feet long.

Volunteer hours for the fence build: 338 hours @ a volunteer rate of \$29.95 per hour or \$10,123.

Volunteer hours for the Wednesday/Thursday Guzzler and old project maintenance: 116 hours = \$3,474.



Travel to/from home: 269 hours.
