### **President's Message**

Hello to all our members of the Bend Chapter of the Oregon Hunters Association

As of May 21st our total membership was at 557. Please join me in welcoming our 4 new members. **Chris Davis**, Jacob Franke, **James Hart** and **Randy Marchbanks**, all from Bend. Thanks for joining and we hope to see you at a meeting or out on a project or other activity soon. Reminder to all to check your membership expiration date.

By the time you receive this newsletter our annual Youth and Family Day will have occurred on the 1st of June. Hope you and your families were able to make it out to enjoy your chapter's event again this year. Special thanks to **Kevin and Wendy Borst** for again being the major force behind this and to **Keith and Connie Cyrus** for the continued use of their property on which to hold this event.

We'll know shortly how lucky we all were when the big game drawing results are available on the 12th.

The thinning project at Road Spring is completed. Four of your chapter members were able to get out there with their chain saws to get it done. Three members worked all day Saturday the 18th of May and another member was able join them to finish up with another long day on Sunday the 19th. That just leaves about a days worth of work to do at Mush Spring to have this thinning/ edging project on the EFM property completed. If you have your sawyer certification and would like to help get this completed, please contact Mary Jo Hedrick. If you don't have her cell number, let myself or Don Clark know and we'll help you get in touch with her. This is the fifth year this chapter has been involved in the wildlife enhancement for this property. The Buck and Pole fencing of the meadow at Pot Hole Spring the first year, was followed by two years of Buck and Pole fencing around the meadow at Smoke Creek. We've been thinning/ edging the lodgepole and cutting most of the juniper around those fences to let more sun light in to enhance the ponderosa pine growth and let the wildlife have a better quality meadow to use. The folks that went out on Saturday were able to see elk leaving the meadow at Road Spring as they arrived. We saw a young buck leaving that same meadow when we got there on Sunday, This is a good sign that our work is accomplishing what we set out to do. Keep in mind that EFM properties are open for the public to use and enjoy for hunting as well. All the owners ask is that you use these properties with respect. Don't camp or have a fire, and to drive only on the open roads.

# May Meeting Recap

In case you were unable to attend our monthly meeting at Big E's on May 8th, here are a <u>few</u> highlights:

Our guest speaker was **Gary Lewis**, He has been an OHA member since 1998 (Bend chapter) and was the Southeast Director for 8 years.

Recently Gary rode along with James Hayes, a La Pinebased senior trooper for the Oregon State Police. Gary took notes of the conversations and observations.

Hayes and Lewis started the shift on China Hat Road. "It happens to be where the mule deer want to go. It's the last little migration route out of the city.", Hayes said.

"This area here is crucial winter range. As you can see, it's lined with RVs and dogs," Hayes said.

"And a lot of these camps have pit bulls for protection and they chase the deer and kill them."

Lewis reported, "China Hat Road, when I moved to Central Oregon," Lewis recalls, "was a graveled gateway into the desert on the south end of Bend. Back in the mid-'90s, the road turned to gravel about a half-mile from the Knott Road intersection."

In the not-too-distant past mule deer herds wintered in the mixed stands of Ponderosa pine, juniper and bitterbrush. It was not uncommon to see a hundred mule deer any afternoon in January.

Hayes and Lewis observed dogs in almost every camp as well as deer bones and elk bones in many of the camps. In one instance a deer rib cage was tacked up on a tree. (see photo in right column)

One resident of a forest encampment had moved to Oregon from Iowa. He boasted his dog had run a big buck for an hour the day before.

"I seen a real majestic looking four-point yesterday and my dog Astrid took off after it for about an hour," the lowan said.

Lewis said Hayes showed him all the new road building activity that the forest campers are engaged in. Lewis remarked on the lack of bitterbrush (an important mule deer food source) where there used to be chest-high stands of bitterbrush. Lewis says the damage to the winter range that has already been done by the illegal forest campers will take 40 to 50 years to be restored.

Lewis showed pictures of trophy mule deer that he wrote about in years past. These bucks were taken 10 to 15 years ago in the newly roaded areas where the forest camps have been built.

"This is what we have lost," Lewis says.

Three funding requests were voted on and passed: Partnering with ODFW to share the cost of a billboard at Wickiup Junction and our half should be no more than \$6520 for the year.

Sponsor Mountain View Trap Team again this year for \$3,000, which helps to cover their cost for participation, ammo, targets, etc.

Even though Candy and Randy Yow did not submit a funding request this year, the membership decided to give them gift cards totaling \$500 for their hunting training camps. Recap continues on page 3







All Hands All Brands For Your Public Lands was initiated five years ago by the Bend OHA Chapter and Ochoco National Forest Wildlife Bio's where numerous NGO's were invited to come to the table and partake in a volunteer project where all would be involved. Last year there were 68 volunteers that put in over a 1,000 hours building Beaver Dam Analogs.



Eric Newman Family Update: As you may recall, Eric Newman was fatally shot at a boat ramp in Montana, while on a family vacation last summer. At the Bend Chapter banquet in March, it was announced that the funds from our "paddle up" segment would go to the Newman family instead of our youth events. After a moving tribute led by Michael O'Casey, bidder #'s were quickly raised all around the room. It was a beautiful moment. This is the fundraiser that Holly refers to in her letter.



Eric Newman's Family: (L to R) Elliott, Holly, Ethan and Violet mountain biking on Eric's birthday; we scattered ashes on a trail we used to ride as a family of five: Peterson Ridge. To Eric's dear friends in the Bend Chapter of OHA:

As I write this, we have just celebrated Eric's first birthday without him. Our three children and I spent the weekend in Sisters: mountain biking, swimming, partying at a wedding, and scattering ashes. Eric was unfairly taken from us (and the rest of our family and friends, and all of you). His absence still seems surreal, but it is slowly becoming the new normal for our family.

We are so thankful for all of the support we have received - in the form of family dinners, childcare, decision-making, kind words, and donations and celebration of Eric. The initial outreach of support was so much that it was overwhelming – and frankly, my brain is still struggling to work and remember things correctly, so it's largely a daze. When Mike wrote that another Fundraiser was planned by you all for our family, I was amazed to know you were still thinking of us. When I heard the total raised afterward, I was stunned. Thank you, so very much.

Eric was innocently murdered by an angry man who was ready to suicide, and he chose to take Eric with him. Our family witnessed his murder. My sister, Lauren Sprunk, and her three children: Tataum, Taylor, and Elias, were on vacation with us, and not many people realize they also endured that horrific day. I had been holding our youngest, Ethan, sleeping in my arms when Eric was shot; I gave him to Tataum, and I ran to pull Eric from his truck and start CPR. They covered Ethan's eyes, so he did not see much of what the rest of us had to. They took care of Ethan and their brother, Elias, keeping them hunkered down and safe until we knew the threat had passed. Taylor took my other two children and hid in the woods to keep them safe. Afterward, she told me so many times "I'm here for you, Aunt Holly. I love you."

My sister, Lauren, who is a nurse, called 9-1-1, and quickly followed me to help with CPR. After others showed up to take over for me, and other bystanders had led me away to my children, Lauren stayed and helped give chest compressions and start an IV line and intubate Eric. Her knees were cut and bloodied and her ankles rubbed raw from kneeling on hot asphalt for an hour trying to save him.

My sister and her children are the unsung heroes from that day. Along with all of the kind, random campers and law enforcement officers and volunteer medical crew, they got us through those moments and the first few days. They also continue to live with this witnessed trauma and grief, and have not had nearly the support that my children and I have, living apart from us, with this experience being largely unknown to their community.

I have decided to use much of the proceeds from your recent fundraiser to start 529 college accounts for all three of our nieces and nephews who were there, and to provide continued financial support for their family's trauma therapy, family therapy, and other supportive care.

The months since Eric has been gone have been filled with more trying times for us - navigating trauma therapy for our oldest two kids, a kidney cancer scare for me (thankfully, not cancer, but I had half of my kidney removed in November), thyroid cancer and surgery for Lauren, half a month in hospitals with an airlift to Portland and chest tube for my daughter, Violet. We are enduring, and just now, finally beginning to transition from surviving to thriving. Thank you for continuing to remember us, to support me and Eric's children, and for this gift to Lauren, Tataum, Taylor and Elias. Our hearts are filled by your love.
