January Meeting Recap

In case you were unable to attend our monthly meeting at Bend VFW on Jan 8th, here are a few highlights:

Our guest speaker was again Bob Buddenbohn, the media manager for the Bend Chapter. He completed his presentation from December and explained the matrix used to assist the board's decision on funding. Now that his computer is working again, Bob was able to show examples of completed grant/ donation requests and how those requests are evaluated. After the applicant fills out the request form, each answer receives a value. This process takes the emotion out of the decision. Since we don't have access to all of the funds in the checking account, we need to prioritize where the available funds will go. He also reviewed some key points from December's meeting. We need to continue our grass roots efforts (bottom up rather than top down) to fulfill OHA's mission statement, to shape the public's perception, and to get more people involved. He also reminded us of the 3 R's: recruit, retain, reactivate. What more can we do for the future, to secure our traditions and hunting culture?

Rex announced that phase 2 has begun for the Bend to Suttle Lake wildlife overpass project. The plan is 4 overpasses between markers 90-95. They are in the process of securing funds. The cost for just the engineering is \$852,000! So far they have \$700,000 in pending grants.

Monty Gregg announced that a documentary is in the works, showing the off-road impact on deer migration.

A safe was purchased for the storage of firearms for the banquet.

Both the nomination and voting for Member of the Year 2024 took place at the January meeting. The winner will be announced at the March monthly meeting and possibly at the banquet. (to save time, we won't be announcing all of the volunteers at the banquet this year)

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

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

WILDLIFE **FENCE REPAIR**

US 97 MP 152 (Jan 15)

This Monday I (Eric Brown) received a call from an OHA Volunteer who said that OSP and ODOT were currently attempting to

get elk out of the highway side of the fence. On Tuesday I was contacted by Warren Nelson, Bend ODOT Maintenance Coordinator who told me about damage on the fence on both sides of the highway and that they were concerned more elk would get through those area. I then drove down to the site to determine what was needed for the repair.

On Wednesday, six OHA volunteers made the repairs that were needed. Due to us having to park along the shoulder of the highway ODOT put out traffic cones and warning signs which were greatly appreciated. We also required all volunteers to wear a bright vest.

On the SB side near the wildlife tunnel the fence had been cut as an attempted outlet for the elk. We spliced in a small section of new fence and then tightened up the fence line in a few areas.

For the NB side there was much more damage. We did one splice in of new fence and we also installed 130' of new fence wire on the highway side and leaving the old wire on the opposite side in place.

19 hours of total volunteer time was recorded to complete this task. Many of these members are actively working with solicitating donors for our March 8 banquet so for them to drop what they were doing and come out and help speaks volumes. Two phone calls were received while repairing the fence from donors in regards to the banquet.

The next week, on Jan 23rd Roger Points, Don Clark, Karl Findling and **Eric Brown** patrolled the full fence (US 97 Lava Butte to Vandevert Rd) removed two trees and performed a few repairs. They do not anticipate any additional work on the fence until Spring.



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Chukar season came to a glorious end.

What a year! I have never seen a chukar year like this one. There were birds just about everywhere I went to hunt in the Oregon desert.

When last year's chukar season ended, I was troubled and bewildered. My male dog, Bandit, was bumping birds and I was not getting the shot opportunities I wanted. But let me back up to explain the journey. My previous GWP was a dog we called Rascal. He was a perfect dog in nearly every way. By the time he was 6 mo old, he was pointing, retrieving, backing, and a great house dog. He was the dog that taught my daughters Kenna and Bryn what upland hunting was about. He naturally knew how to hunt.

When Rascal was 7, he came down with lymphoma and within a few short months, he had passed. Enter Bandit. Bandit was an 8-week-old male GWP pup that filled the hole in the lineup left by Rascal. Bandit is a very athletic dog with a lot of prey drive. Unfortunately, in his first few training sessions, he was able to trap and catch some planted chukars. By his third training session, he had made up his mind that chukars were his for the taking. Now I had my hands full and since I'm not a professional dog trainer, I was in way over my head.

By the time Bandit was two years old, I had been shopping for a companion dog for him. My initial excuse was that Bandit needed a companion to play with in order to have a place for some of that ENERGY to go. But I think in the back of my mind I was thinking I would have a fallback plan if I couldn't fix him from busting birds. I had also started spending time with a professional trainer.

Enter Quincy. Quincy was a sweet 8-week-old female GWP. She just loves to cuddle. Side note: When Kenna went off to college, I got Bandit. When Bryn went off to college, I got Quincy. I'm accused of replacing my daughters with dogs, they won't let me forget it.

By the time I got Quincy I had acquired more training tools. I had started raising my own pigeons as training birds, purchased some bird launches, and started training with some much more experienced folks at NAVHDA. It didn't take long to learn that Quincy had a much better nose than Bandit and a much stronger pointing instinct. She was everything I had hoped she would be.

When the 2024 season ended, I was disappointed. I had not been getting out as much as I had hoped to and Bandit was still untrustworthy around birds. Quincy was coming along nicely but needed more training to refine her skills. When the 2025 season started, I had multiple big game tags in various states and my time was tied up trying to make the best of them. When we finally did start getting after it we had so-so success. The dogs were doing better than the previous year and I was crediting that to a lot of off-season training. But there were still issues. My friend Dominic Bachman (Bachman Bay Kennels) suggested that I hunt the dogs one at a time. He said they were too attached to each other and not focused enough on me. It made a difference. They both became much more tuned into me while we were hunting and what I was asking them to do. Although, I learned the hard way that if I leave one in the truck, I had better have him/her in a kennel or they will eat the truck to try to get out to hunt!

Things were looking up. Dogs were pointing birds and I was luckily able to hit a few for successful harvests. I was starting to see a path to success. But still I had to worry about Bandit. He just loves to push the range out beyond what I'm comfortable with. To be fair, he is a Bone Point Kennel dog and right on their website they say, "our dogs run big." He works the field hard and at a fast pace and if I'm honest, his nose is not that great. I think a lot of times when he bumps birds, he doesn't realize they are there until after they flush. He's so athletic that he will hunt hard at a run for hours and hours without tiring. Lots of drive to go with that athleticism. As a result, I'm in the habit of checking him in with the tone on his e-collar and he knows to listen to it or it will be followed by a correction.

By early December, I was really starting to doubt if I would keep Bandit long term. Quincy was doing great and Bandit just couldn't be trusted to hold a point. I could see a time where I would re-home him and focus on her. I managed to get in quite a few hunts from December to the end of January. We traveled across the Oregon desert 2x a week most weeks and stayed out overnight more than once. The dogs were getting lots of work and given how many birds there were this season, this was the year to take advantage of it.

Somewhere along the way in December, Quincy, who also has a lot of bird drive and just gets so excited, started barking on fresh bird scent. That does not bode well for making birds hold! It was easy to know when we were on fresh scent, but it wasn't easy to get any shots in unless you like taking 80-yard hail Mary shots!

I started running her with a bark collar on next to her e-collar. We had some success with that but the barking is still a problem. Another thing to address in the off season.

But Bandit, he was really starting to figure things out. He was holding points, and slowing down at the hint of fresh scent, and working smarter. In the last week of chukar hunting we made it up the steep slope to gain the ridge we were planning to hunt. Quincy was working pretty close, Bandit was doing his thing at 80 - 130 yards. I was watching him like a hawk. I was on the right side of the ridge top. He worked back and forth. On one such run over to the left edge, he went out of sight which he had done several times already. I watched, wondering if he would check back in any second or disappear. I didn't fully trust him. I kept moving and watching. Seconds went by. He should have checked in by now. I got nervous and toned him to come back. The moment I hit the tone button I saw a nice covey of chukars fly off the ridge away from me. That's when I knew, he had been on point and right on top of them. I felt like an idiot for not walking up the 100 yards to check in person. That flush was my fault. Bandit came back a few steps and into sight. He just stood there and looked at me for a few seconds. I had a feeling he was saying "really dad, you had to go and screw that up?"



We hunted up the ridge for about three more miles before getting to a good turn around point. We found coveys along the way and put birds in the bag. The dogs did good. They found them, pointed them and retrieved them. Quincy still barking on fresh scent and me still missing more than I was hitting. I was really starting to trust Bandit. He had not bumped a single bird that day.

We were about ¾ of a mile from the point we would drop off the ridge and return to the truck. Bandit went over the ridge edge to my right. I watched for him to come back. He didn't. This east

side of the ridge is where we had found all the birds throughout the day. I checked the controller and it was acting erratic. It would say he was at 106 yds and then it would say he was at 72 yards. Then it would say 90 yards and then 55 yards. It was all over the place. I knew that edge was lined by rimrock and my guess was he had dropped over the rim. I hurried over there to see with my own eyes. I was not going to make the same mistake I had made earlier and tone him to come back. It took me a while to get over there. I had Quincy stay close to me to avoid her "barking." When I got to the rim, sure enough, Bandit had dropped below it. He was on point, nose and eyes directly down hill. There was heavy cover and some boulders on a very steep slope with some scree. Quincy went just up the ridge from him. She too dropped below through a crack in the rim and for a second I thought she was going to bust in there. But she went on point and held hard. I wanted a picture but more importantly I decided I wanted another bird or two for the bag. I worked my way down and next to Bandit, ready for a shot. Nothing happened. I put a hand on him and quietly told him good dog. I started to work below him. Five feet later, I slipped and fell. I quickly got up readying for a shot expecting birds to bust out. None did. Nothing happened. I moved my eyes

back and forth looking for movement somewhere, anywhere nearby. I looked back at the dogs. They were still intensely focused and holding point. I went down another few steps. Nothing. I'm starting to wonder if the birds had left before I got there. I also was thinking there might be just one bird here, somewhere. Another couple of steps. Now I'm 20 feet below the dogs and questioning if I can go any further in this terrain before it becomes un-

safe. Then, right in front of me there was an explosion. No less than 40 birds, that had been in a very tight covey, went off in every direction. Down and away at lightning speed. There were so many, and so tight, I just couldn't pick out a single bird to shoot. In hindsight, this would have been the time, if there ever is a time, to just flock shoot but I didn't. I didn't fire a shot. Then, a few seconds later, a lone chukar took off and I fired. A miss! Bandit was still on point. Quincy was barking her fool head off and running around. I was yelling, "No Bird!"

I went up and gave Bandit a big hug and told him what a good dog he was. This was the year he figured out how to put it all together and become the hunting dog I had always hoped he would be and for a few years had feared he never would. Now, I can't wait until next year. I suspect that it will be another good year, and me and my dogs are going to put on many more miles and chase that elusive Hungarian partridge we call the Chukar.
